On May 18 (Wed.), ILEC and UNEP held an international webinar "Taking major step toward mainstreaming lakes" by ZOOM in conjunction with the 4th Asia-Pacific Water Summit (4th APWS), welcoming representatives from the Indonesian government, the Japanese Ministry of Environment, and others. The webinar, which discussed specific actions and challenges for mainstreaming lakes into the global water agenda, was attended by 135 participants from 20 countries around the world.

The world's lakes and other lentic waters have long been suffering from serious degradation despite their enormous value and their critical roles in the global ecosystem. They have long been kind of a missing link in the Global Water Agenda and the SDGs.

At the last UNEA5.2, a very important Resolution entitled "Sustainable Lake Management," was adopted unanimously. The draft of this Resolution proposed by the Government of Indonesia and supported by many member states around the world for its adoption. Now, it is time for us to work together for achieving "Sustainable Lake Management" in line with the adopted Resolution.
